

The name Ezri means "my help" in Hebrew. The name is a variant of Ezra, meaning to help or support. The name Ezri is mentioned only once in the Bible, in 1 Chronicles 27:26. He is a son of Chelub and one of King David's overseers.

Ezri comes from a litter of 7 pups, three of whom are black. GDA sends us home with a bag full of goodies, which includes a blanket, food bowl, toy, brush, leash, collar, a bag of food, and plenty of literature as to what to do now that we have our new pup. They are very organized and thorough.

Ezri is part of a new program called "Puppy Head Start" which has introduced her to many obstacles and new environments while in the nursery so she already has a head start on her training when she comes home.






Isn't she beautiful? Big too. She is just 7 weeks old here.

And just kept on smiling when she got home too.







During training we always have to keep in mind how this will affect her job with someone who is visually impaired. An obsession with everyday objects that can be found at a park, could be a risk if the pup decides they want to play with their favorite toy. This is a specially designed pool toy with grooves.



Every morning Ezri wakes up with a lot of energy and does "zoomies" in the front yard. Zoomies are when the pups just zoom, zoom, zoom around until their energy is spent. GDA always stresses a tired pup is a happy pup. She does look happy.



This picture was taken during a sleepover at another puppy raiser's home. It's important for her to get used to new sleeping environments to help make transitioning successful.






Playing PeekaBoo with my grandson. Ezri is not big enough to climb up this slide, but she does try.






It's important Ezri learns to stop and sit on command even when she's busy playing with toys while visiting a friend's house. She looks like she's striking a pose.
