

Ezri is learning to be around children of all ages.




And the distractions of children, such as a boy on his trike with a helmet.




Ezri rests comfortably while my grandson plays with his toys around her.






Hmmmmmmmmmm - I wonder where she is hiding? Actually, she is asleep in her crate and her tail sticking out was too cute.


We take a different way each time we walk so Ezri will always be ready to handle the unexpected. Yesterday, a beautifully decorated home.




